Lee was the greatest man who ever lived, and the Confederates were underdogs who lost the Civil War with honor. Now, as


a retired brigadier general and Professor

Please join us via Zoom on January 23rd. I will send you a link the day before the meeting. There will not be a password necessary to join us.





New Bedford Civil War Round Table

TIMELINE—JANUARY 1861

THE CIVIL WAR ON THE HORIZON

- ...Jan1 New Year's Day is dark and gloomy in Washington D.C. At the White House there is the usual reception, colorful and gay on the surface, but on the surface only. At Charleston preparations continued with organization of troops, guarding of wharfs, night patrols, and general mobilization.
- ...Jan 2 President-elect Lincoln received letters threatening violence at the inauguration. USS Brooklyn was ordered to be ready to sail to Fort Sumpter with supplies for Major Anderson. Col. Charles P. Stone was ordered to organize the militia to defend the District of Columbia.
- ...Jan 3 Rumors spread of armed bands being organized to capture Washington. South Carolina seized Fort Johnson in Charleston Harbor, a no longer a military base. Georgia state troops seized Fort Pulaski near the mouth of the Savannah River.
- ...Jan 4 The deep Southern States began to seize Federal forts and arsenals. Salmon P. Chase arrived in Springfield at the invitation of Mr. Lincoln; the discussion was cabinet appointments.
- ...Jan 5 <u>The Star of the West</u> vessel took the place of the Brooklyn and left New York for Fort Sumter for the purpose of resupply.
- ...Jan 6 Mayor Fernando Wood of New York City proposed that if the Union were dissolved, New York should be a "free" city, able to trade with both North and South.
- ...Jan 7 At Washington, the House of Representatives approved Maj. Anderson's shift from Fort Moultrie to Fort Sumter. In the Senate, John J. Crittenden spoke for his Compromise. It is as follows. "I am for the Union; but my friends, I must also be for the equal rights of my State under this great Constitution and in this great Union." He proclaimed that residents of his state of Kentucky had as much right to take slaves into the territories as those who were opposed had a right to go without them.
- ...Jan 8 President Buchanan sends a depressing special message to Congress. He advocated the Compromise of Crittenden, dividing the territories along the line of the old Missouri Compromise Line.
- ...Jan 9 Star of the West fails to relieve Fort Sumter. First serious artillery shots fired in Charleston harbor. Mississippi becomes the second state to secede
- ...Jan 10 Major Anderson is told at Fort Sumter to act strictly on the defensive but to defend his position. William H. Seward accepted the post of Secretary of State in the Cabinet being formed.
- ...Jan 11 To Republican Congressman James T. Hale of Pennsylvania President-Elect Lincoln wrote that he had won an election and "Now we are told in advance, the government is to broken up, unless we surrender to those we have beaten, before we have taken the offices." He added "if we surrender, it is the end of us, and the government."
- ...Jan 18 Southern state legislatures continue to pass ordinances of secession. In a dramatic and moving scene in the United States Senate, five senators from Florida, Alabama, and Mississippi left the chamber. Jefferson Davis of Mississippi gave a heartfelt speech before withdrawing. "I concur in the actions of the people of Mississippi, believing it to be necessary and proper, and should have been bound by their action if my believe had been otherwise...I am sure I have no hostility to you, Senators from the North. I am sure not one of you, whatever sharp discussion there may have been between us, to whom I cannot now say, in the presence of God, I wish you well... Mr. President, and Senators, having made the announcement which the occasion seemed to me require, it only remains for me to bid you a final farewell,"


The Bullets Flew Like Hell: Cutler's brigade at Gettysburg. From McPherson's Ridge to Culp's Hill

Who relieved Gen John Buford at the critical moment on the first day of Gettysburg. It was Cutler's Infantry consisting of the 76th, 95th, and the 147th New York Regiments as well as the 14th Brooklyn, 56th Pennsylvania, and the 7th Indiana.

Their heroic efforts delayed the Confederate offensive long enough for additional Army of the Potomac infantry units to arrive.




