

The New Bedford Civil War Round Table Langlois Book Award Committee has started it's 2024 search for area high school seniors who will qualify for this award.



Longstreet: The Confederate General Who Defied the South



It was the most remarkable political about-face in American history. During the Civil War, General James Longstreet fought tenaciously for the Confederacy. He was alongside Lee at Gettysburg. He won a major Confederate victory at Chickamauga and was seriously wounded during a later battle.

After the war Longstreet moved to New Orleans, where he dramatically changed course. He supported Black voting and joined the newly elected, integrated postwar government in Louisiana. When white supremacists took up arms to oust that government, Longstreet leading the interracial state ,ilitia, did battle against former Confederates.

Elizabeth Varon does an excellent job of not only tracing Longstreet's career and contributions, but delves into the reasons for his actions, his justifications, and his desire to make a better life for all Southerners.



The Civil War on the Water: Favorite Stories and Fresh Perspectives from the Historians at Emerging Civil War

Edited by Dwight Sturtevant Hughes and Chris Mackowski

Although primarily a land conflict, the Civil War also raged on the water.

Nothing in the history and traditions of the U.S. Navy prepared it for civil war. The sea service expanded tenfold from a third-rate force to, at least temporarily, one of the most powerful and advanced navies in the world. Former shipmates now serving in the Confederacy, meanwhile, struggled to construct some semblance of a navy from practically nothing, applying innovative technologies and underdog strategies that would achieve more than anyone thought possible.

The resulting war on the water stretched from the Arctic Circle to the Caribbean in

a stunning display of machine-age technologies that included ironclads, torpedoes, submarines, steam propulsion, and improved heavy artillery. Swift Rebel raiders like the CSS Shenandoah decimated Union commerce while hundreds of storm-tossed blockaders patrolled the meandering southern coastline from Hatteras to Galveston to interdict enemy commerce.

Titanic clashes erupted between seacoast fortifications and Mr. Lincoln's warships at Port Royal, New Orleans, Charleston, Wilmington, and Mobile. Massive amphibious operations on the Virginia Peninsula, in the North Carolina Sounds, and at Fort Fisher presaged 20th-century conflicts. Farther inland, the two services invented various riverine warfare tactics that played decisive roles at Memphis, Forts Henry and Donelson, Vicksburg, Island No. 10, and elsewhere.

...In New York City convicted slave trader Nathaniel Gordon is hanged.

...The U.S.S. Monitor left New York City for sea trials.

Mar...Confederate forces in the New Mexico Territory under H.H. Sibley entered Santa Fe after Federals retired to Fort Union to the northeast.

...Federal troops under Nathaniel Banks advanced up the Shenandoah Valley from Harper's Ferry toward Winchester Va.

...Action begins at Pea Ridge, or Elk Horn Tavern Ark.

...Van Dorn's weakened Confederate forces retreat toward the Arkansas River. It was the last major offensive 1864.

...President Lincoln issues War Order his grand movement to the Peninsula.

...The Battle of the Monitor and the Merrimack begins at 9:00 a.m. March 9

...Lincoln issues War Order #3 officially removing McClellan as General-In-Chief but retains him as Department Commander Army of the Potomac.

...Battle of Kernstown in the Shenandoah Valley—marks the beginning of Jackson's Valley campaign

...President Lincoln, believing McClellan did nor honor his commitment to protect Washington D.C. with sufficient troops, orders troops back to the Capital. This back and forth is still being discussed today.
