Rededication of the Robert Gould Shaw and the 54th Regiment Memorial

On June 1, 2022 The Shaw 54th Memorial was rededicated on Boston Commons, after an extensive \$3 million dollar multi year renovation. The sculptor, Augustus St. Gaudens labored over this piece for 14 years. The restoration work was completed by Louis C. Allegrone Construction and a team of bronze conservators at Skylight Studios, in partnership with the NPS, city of Boston, Friends of the Public Garden, and Museum of African American History, Boston and Nantucket.




Speaker for September 27, 2022

Megan Kate Nelson, Ph.D.

Dr. Nelson returns to the New Bedford Civil War Round Table for the third or fourth time, this time to introduce her newest book,



"Saving Yellowstone". Each year nearly four million people visit Yellowstone National Park, but few know the fascinating historical context in which it was established. In late July 1871, the geologist-explorer Ferdinand Hayden led a team of scientists through a narrow canyon into Yellowstone Basin, entering one of the last unmapped places in the country. The survey's discoveries led to the passage of the Yellowstone Act in 1872, which created the first national park in the world.



Saving Yellowstone follows Hayden and two other protagonists in pursuit of their own agendas: Sitting Bull, a Lakota leader who asserted his peoples' claims to their homelands, and financier Jay Cook, who wanted to secure his national reputation by building the Northern Pacific Railroad through the Great Northwest. Hayden, Cooke, and Sitting Bull staked their claims to Yellowstone at a critical moment in Reconstruction, when the Grant Administration and the 42nd Congress were testing the reach and the purpose of federal power across the nation.

Buried with her fellow Civil War veterans. Headstone erected by the Massachusetts Woman's Relief Corps Post #53. Grand Army of the Republic

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


NEW BEDFORD IN THE CIVIL WAR

New Bedford Gave Beyond its Quota in Civil War

(Reprint from the Morning Mercury Jan 13, 1940 and the Standard Times Jan 13, 1941)

Though New Bedford had been lukewarm in former wars, It felt a deep interest in the conflict between the states. Few other cities did more in proportion to its means and its population to uphold the union's cause. On the morning of April 16, 1861, four days after the attack on Fort Sumter, the New Bedford Guards, Company I, Third Regiment Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry responded to President Lincoln's first call and entrained for service.



Thus went the first of 3,200 men furnished by New Bedford during the war, a surplus of 1,110 men over the number demanded by the government.



In addition to furnishing its quota for the army, New Bedford sent about 1,336 men into the navy. Home defense was undertaken by putting Fort Phoenix in order, and by erecting a sand battery on Clark's Point which mounted three 24 pounders. The Ladies' Soldiers Relief Society was formed two days after the departure of the Home Guards. This society donated in cash over \$20,000 and \$10,000 in cotton goods, flannel and hospital stores.


During the four years' war the city expended \$125,495.85 for the support of Volunteers' families, and \$177,000 in other ways on account of the year. Loyally responding to the first call in every local and national emergency since 1925, The Merchants National Bank continues to aid the community in every banking capacity. (end of reprint)


